

## Frequently Heard Questions Jonathan Carlsen

**Question:** In April, you quoted John Wesley's *Journal* where he states his conviction that the Bible contains no mistakes and you gave the date of the *Journal* entry as July 24, 1776. But A. Skevington Wood, in *The Burning Heart: John Wesley: Evangelist* (Minneapolis: Bethany Fellowship, 1978), quotes the same words, but gives the date as August 24, 1776 (p. 214). Which is correct?

Answer: I'm 99% sure that the date is July 24. Arthur Skevington Wood (1917-1993), an outstanding British Methodist churchman and scholar, produced a great Wesley biography in *The Burning Heart*. But this one time, he or a copy editor made a mistake. I got the quotation from Wesley's *Journal* as it appears in the 14-volume third edition of *The Works of John Wesley*, edited by Thomas Jackson, first published in 1829-1831 and still in print (vol. 4, p. 82). The top-of-the-page date reference is "Aug. 1776." "Jul. 1776," appears on p. 81, with entries for July 6, 9, and 13-16. On p. 82 we have "Wed. 17," "Wed. 24" with our quotation, and then "Sun. 28." Halfway down the page is "Fri. August 2," and then August 4 and 6. Wood reportedly references the 8-volume, 1909-1916 edition of *John Wesley's Journal*, edited by Nehemiah Curnock, vol. 6, p. 117. It may have contained a similarly misleading marginal date reference, or else the copy editors may have checked the date in the Jackson edition.

**Question:** In April, you wrote, "Worldwide, most UMs believe with John Wesley" in a mistake-free Bible. How do you figure that this group comprises "most UMs"?

**Answer:** How do you (or I) define *most*? 50% + 1? 75%? 99.9%? In Africa, the UMC's fastest growing region, the belief is nearly unanimous. I said, "most," based on a statistic reported by United Methodist Mark Tooley about 2000, when he was a researcher at the Institute on Religion and Democracy. He is now its president. As I remember, he reported that a research study (possibly from Pew Research or the Barna Group) had reported that 70% of UMs believed in a mistake-free Bible. As I remember, this study focused on *American* UMs and not the UMC overseas where the percentages are higher.

**Question:** When did Jesus appear to the disciples including Thomas after Easter (Jn. 20:26-29)? Some Bibles say, "eight days later" or "after eight days" (ESV, KJV, NKJV, NLT). That would be the Monday after Easter Monday. Others say, "a week later" (NCV, NEB, NIV, NRSV, TEV), or Sunday. Which is it?

Answer: Here once again, the literal translation is misleading. John Wesley, in his KJV revision that accompanies his *Explanatory Notes upon the New Testament*, repeats their literal translation, "after eight days." But he says in his *Notes* that this means, "On the next Sunday." David H. Stern, translator of the *Complete Jewish Bible*, explains that this is because "By Jewish reckoning the first and last days are counted; therefore this was a week later" (*Jewish New Testament Commentary*, Clarksville, MD: Jewish New Testament Publications, 1992, note on Jn. 20:26, p. 212). In other words, Easter was Day 1 and the next Sunday was Day 8.

Now that the sun is hot we need to prevent and detect skin cancer. Apply your sunscreen (30SPF or higher) and apply it often. Wear sunglasses. Some antibiotics may make skin more sensitive to the sun such as Tetracycline as well as Ibuprofen. Wear a hat that will protect your face, ears and neck. Please check your skin often and see your dermatologist when you notice any changes.

Do you have an itching, burning, pain or tingling in sections of your body? Do blisters appear across the chest, back and perhaps around the eyes, neck or face? It might be SHINGLES! If you have had chicken pox, the virus can sometimes live, hide or sleep in your body. Years later the virus can wake up and cause shingles. Most often shingles affect people age 50 and older. Shingles can be horribly painful and a pain you will never forget. Talk to your Dr. about receiving the shingles shot.



# More About Stephen Ministry Dean Winston

This is another example of the relationship between a Stephen Minister and their care receiver. Again, the names and identifying details are protected by confidentiality.

Martha and Mike had been married 59 years when mike passed away suddenly. He had no health issues that they were aware of, his heart just stopped. Martha was devastated. Her world had come crashing down around her. Their church reached out to her immediately. She and Mike were very active, in fact Martha was a Stephen Minister and accepted one that was offered to her immediately. Jane was assigned to Martha as her Stephen Minister. They had been friends and colleagues for years.

Mike had been a bomber pilot in the Second World War and then, an insurance executive when he got out, until he retired to Florida. He had taken care of their finances for their entire married life. Martha had no idea how much money they had or where it was or who they owed. She was completely caught off guard. She didn't even know his password to get into his computer.

Jane was a widow of ten years and she had been through much the same, so she helped guide Martha in what she had to do. Fortunately, Martha's daughter is a computer whiz. When she came down to help her mother with the funeral arrangements and memorial service she was able to access the computer and begin to sort out the finance and insurance information.

After the memorial service and funeral, and her daughter had gone back home Martha began to feel the loneliness that follows after losing a spouse. She was grateful for her church and Jane. They continued to meet regularly. Jane encouraged Martha to pursue educating other members in the church who had no idea of their finances or what had to be done when someone passes. Martha saw the need, and with her own experiences as a guide, began with the help of Jane, to develop a booklet that could be distributed to the congregation as to how they could prepare for their own passing. The booklet encouraged all to make arrangements in great detail sparing their loved ones critical decision at a time of severe loss.

Martha released Jane as her Stephen Minister a little more than a year after her husband's death. She still grieved for him, but the pain was less. She felt she was ready to have her own care receiver now, someone suffering loss, or contending with illness, or simply needing encouragement. She had been on both sides now and had a better understanding of the pain of loss. She also wanted to continue to educate others on the need to prepare and be prepared for the end of this life and the beginning of the next.
